



Additions To Faculty

There have been changes made in the faculty and the following teachers have been added to the school: Miss Gladys Whaley, who is a graduate of the Farmville Normal School; Miss Mary Moore, of Randolph-Macon College; Miss Mary Virginia Johnson, who is also of Randolph-Macon College, and Miss Estelle Davis, of William and Mary.

The increase in the faculty has made it possible to offer twenty classes in the High School. besides four years of English, mathematics. history; three years of Latin and two years of science offered heretofore, the school is offering home economics, French and a business
