Thinking of writing your story?

Consider publishing your Clark County connections in the *Trail Breakers*.

Patricia Law Hatcher publishes in short stories. First, it is not overwhelming and second, she often gets around that brick wall. Sharon Carmack also said one of the best ways to get around that brick wall is to put it in print (publish it!).

Try writing about your family member and then submit for publication in a genealogical magazine in the area where you ancestor lived. Voice your doubts about information you are unsure of. Then the reader is clear that those facts are undocumented or in conflict with other information. Include your name and how to write you with corrections. Be sure to document your article with proper citations.

## Brown House Revisited

S.W. Brown was a familiar name in early Clark County. June 11, 1861, appointed by Abraham Lincoln as Receiver of Public Moneys in the Land Office in Vancouver, Samuel arrived in this area with his wife, Harriet H. Miles, and sons, Charles and Floyd M. Another son, Edward Lincoln, was born in Vancouver. Charles was born July 1850 and married Rebecca A. Slocum in Vancouver September 10, 1874.<sup>1</sup> The obituary of Charles Brown appeared in the April 21, 1901 editorial in the *Columbian*:

**Charles Brown**<sup>2</sup> was born in Knoxville, Illinois, July 15, 1850 and came to Vancouver in 1861 with his parents by way of the Isthmus and San Francisco, when he was only 11. Because schools provided only a meager education, after attending school he began a course of self-study and then went to San Francisco, where he worked at the printing trade for several years. He then returned to Vancouver and in 1874 he married Rebecca Slocum at the Brown house where they resided and their three daughters were born.

Mr. Brown lived an active and progressive life. He was prominently identified with the growth and prosperity of the city for years, was mayor and was a member of the city council. He took an active interest in politics and was elected to the office of county auditor four successive terms. In 1891 he was elected president of the First National Bank, with which institution he has since been connected.

He naturally possessed genial and social disposition and exceedingly generous impulse, inclined to look on the dark side of life recently would give himself over to morose and melancholy thought. Fellow citizens were confident in, esteemed him, and trusted the management of large properties without the thought of a bond or security, and with implicit confidence in his honesty. Notwithstanding the dark circumstances, which attend his untimely death, he will long be remembered by a

multitude of friends, as the kind father, the loving husband, the obliging neighbor and respected citizen.

The funeral held at the family residence two o'clock Monday was largely attended, many friends from Portland taking this opportunity to pay their last tribute. Pall bearers, friends of the deceased were: George H. Stevenson, L. B. Clough, A. J. Cook, E. M. Rande, A. C. Chumasero and Chatfield Knight. All of the family attended except for S. W. Brown, father of the deceased, and Mrs. E. L. Carpenter, oldest daughter, who are both sick.

**Failure of the bank:** The bank, of which Charles Brown was president, during the boom of earlier years, loaned too much money on security that became almost worthless when the panic came in 1893. For years the bank had been struggling to get out from under the heavy load, and bank examiners earlier had not caught the discrepancies. Mr. Maxwell, however, after making a full examination of the assets, together with the cash on hand, found it to be insolvent. The last statement issued in February, showed that it carried about \$230,000 deposits, and as a result of its failure nearly everybody in Vancouver of any financial standing has lost, or apparently lost, more or less money. The directors of the bank were F.N. Marshall, L.M. Hidden, C.H. Funk, and Brown and Canby.

District Attorney Gay, after a consultation with Maxwell, drew up a complaint, charging President Brown and Cashier Canby with making a false entry in their books. The complaint was made to Superior Court Judge A. L.

Miller, who issued a warrant for the arrest of the two men. Sheriff Marsh immediately began a search for the missing officials.

Both families believed from the first that the missing men would be found dead. A party organized to search for the bodies consisting of A.C. Chumasero, Miles Smith, Milton Evans, M.L. Coovert, J.A. Munday, George DuBois, Chas. McCarty, O.H. Pebbles, Harry Burgy, O.H. Smith, Chas. Reynolds, M.R. Sparks, Foster Hidden and E.L. Brown, under the lead of Chatfield Knight. James Munday, one of the party, came upon the bodies and called to the others of the party. The bodies lay upon their backs with their feet almost together, Brown holding the pistol, there being only one for both shots, showing that Canby had shot himself first. (Canby's profile follows.)

**Edmund L. Canby<sup>4</sup>** born in Wilmington, Delaware, May 8, 1848, to Edmond and Mary (Price) Canby, natives of Delaware and Maryland respectively, descended from Quaker ancestors, from the early colonial settlers of New England. Edmund, the youngest of ten children, was educated in Delaware. Later he was employed as clerk in the lumbering business, clerk in a flourmill, and in 1877 became assistant to his brother, Major James P. Canby, Paymaster in the United States Army. Then Edmund made his home at Portland, Oregon, until July, 1883, when he was then elected cashier of the First National Bank with the following officers: President, Louis Sohns; Vice-President, David Wall; Cashier, E.L. Canby. He acted as cashier for eighteen years.

Canby had been active in Vancouver and Clark county, supporting the area with finances and otherwise. In 1884 he married Miss Frances Burnside, a native of Oregon and eldest daughter of D.W. Burnside, an old and respected Oregon pioneer, coming to the Pacific coast via the Panama route in 1850. Five children have been born to the Canbys, two boys and three girls, the oldest of which is 16 years, one girl preceding him in death. Canby was social and genial – a home man, spending most all his time outside of banking hours with his wife and family.

The funeral held at the family residence 11:30 Tuesday. The services held by Rev. Birkhead, St. Luke's Episcopal church, were short but impressive. He was interred in the Riverview cemetery in Portland. A special car was chartered for the family and immediate friends of the family who attended from here. E.M. Rands, A.C. Chumasero, L. B. Clough, Geo. H. Stevenson, A. J. Cook, W. H. Arnold, F. M. Marshall and C. G. Shaw, all intimate friends of the deceased, acted as pall bearers.

## Some English Names

From the 3 Oct 1890 *Bandon Recorder*, Bandon, Coos, Oregon

Many who have struggled hopelessly with the pronunciation of English names will be glad of this list, which deals phonetically with a few of the most difficult cases:

Talbot is pronounced Tolbut.

Thames is pronounced Tems.

Bulwer is pronounced Buller.

Cowper is pronounced Cooper.

Holburn is pronounced Hobun.

Wemyss is pronounced Weems.

Knolloys is pronounced Knowles.

Cockburn is pronounced Coburn.

Brougham is pronounced Broom.

Norwich is pronounced Norridge.

St. Leger is pronounced Sillinger.

Hawarden is pronounced Harden.

Colquhoun is pronounced Cohoon.

Cirencester is pronounced Sissiter.

Grosvenor is pronounced Grovenor.

Salisbury is pronounced Sawlsbury.

Beauchamp is pronounced Beecham.

Marylbron is pronounced Marrabun.

Abergavenny is pronounced Abergenny.

Majoribanks is pronounced Marchbanks.

Bolingbroke is pronounced Bullingbrook.

Cholnorondley is pronounced Chumly.

### Census of 1849, when Clark County was a part of Oregon and called Vancouver County.

The census of 1849 was taken when Clark County was under the name of Vancouver County and still a part of Oregon. Oregon did not become a state until ten years later, so the 1850 census was taken when Clark County was also a part of Oregon. On March 2, 1853, Washington Territory was established. Clark(e) County was no longer under the jurisdiction of Oregon Territory (it was not yet a state itself). Oregon became a state February 14, 1849.

Representative Richard H. Stanton of Kentucky was responsible for naming Washington state after our first President. The citizens of Washington had promoted Columbia as the name. Noting that Columbia was already recognized (by the district of Columbia), he amended the February 8, 1853, federal bill from "Columbia Territory" to "Washington Territory." Little did he know the confusion that would create in future years. President Millard Fillmore signed the Territorial act of March 2, 1853. Until 1862 Washington Territory also included Idaho. Isaac Stevens governed the new territory.

On George Washington's birthday, February 22<sup>nd</sup>, President Grover Cleveland signed the act to make Washington a state, but it was not until the 11<sup>th</sup> of November, 1889, that the proclamation of admission was issued.

The 1849 census tells us that 50 US citizens and 20 foreign citizens were absent -- possibly to the gold fields of California and a part of the "Gold Rush."

A microfilm copy of the census was found at the Archives in Salem, Oregon. Jane Germann copied the census and interpreted it. She went to the CCGS library where Pat Wildman, who worked as a nurse and was used to deciphering handwriting, was on duty. She unraveled some of the names. Don Finel came by to offered fresh eyes to look at the document. Then Ruth Fisher dropped by the library with Mary Huston. Ruth was familiar with the old names and offered some well suggested names. When we were checking names against an 1850 census, Ruth realized that a person she had been searching for was there with a misspelled name. (Rewards come!) The results are a compilation of several people's input, and we hope this will be valuable to researchers.

## Supplementary Census Schedules

Have you ever looked up the supplementary schedules? Many of us have check out the mortality schedule, but what about the others?

The schedules can give a snapshot of the economy of the area - did you realize that Clark County had so many industries in 1850 - two and both based on lumber? Farming was not considered the industry it was nearly one hundred years later. The county was still an infant - a district of the Oregon Territory. The British had had control of the area for a half-century prior and the influence of their Fort on the area in 1850 when it was considered US property was considerable: P.S. Skene headed up this area in 1850.

And what about the social schedule? The Boarding school was Richard Covington, with his wife Ann. The boarders were Jane Hall, John Van Phister, Donald and John Mc Intosh, Mary A. And Alexander Birney, James Grant and Isaac Odgen. But who was the private teacher? Time for some more research.

Check out the population of 1849 - Did you realize how the discovery of gold had such an effect? Twenty absent, and 39 present with the men? Nearly one third of the men went looking for gold! JG

**Endowment Fund**

The Clark County Genealogy Society has established an Endowment Fund to provide funds to promote the future study and practice of genealogy and the preservation of historical and genealogical materials, by new means and methods that otherwise are not available to the Society under existing sources of funding. Endowment funds are distinguished from on-going sources of funding, such as dues or other contributions in two ways. First, on-going funds can be fully expended while only income from the Endowment Fund will be available; the principle will be maintained. Second, on-going funds are fully available for on-going operation of the Society while it is envisioned that Endowment monies will be used for special projects such as; construction of new buildings, creation of new programs, capital fixtures or visionary uses such as programs for school children or seniors.

It is possible to contribute to the Endowment in a number of ways. Some of these include; cash donations, gifts of securities or real estate, gifts of life insurance, bequests from wills and naming the Society in various types of charitable trusts. Seminars are being planned which will more fully explain the purposes of the Endowment Fund as well as various ways to contribute. These Seminars will include presentations by a lawyer who can explain the benefits and mechanisms for establishing various types wills and trusts. We also plan to develop written materials that will also help in understanding these rather complex issues.

Implementation of this Endowment Fund is in its infancy. The Board of CCGS has adopted a Charter and a small committee has held one meeting to discuss its implementation. We are looking for at least one more member to serve on the committee as well as input any member of the Society may have. ## “Visiting Around”

### CLARK BROWN VISITS

#### **Burton to Hear Henry Wagner Recall Days of Tall Trees and Primitive Roads When He Homesteaded a Farm There**

It was a rainy day and the country grocery store was crowded. The topic of conversation was farming. Finally, a city traveling salesman entered, listened for a moment and said:

"The trouble with you old time farmers is that you are not modern. You cling to the old horse and buggy days. Times have changed. We are living in a new era. The old customs must vanish, the new take their places."

"Maybe young man, you know what you are talking about," said an old pioneer, "but if you will take the pains to check up you will find the old pioneers who are farmers or business men are eating three squares a day, paying their bills and can borrow a few dollars at the bank when necessary."

A few days ago the writer called on two of these farmers of the Burton district.

"A little improvement has been made in the way of roads since you were here last," said Henry Wagner, the first one we called on. "We have a 240-acre farm and have a good graveled country road around the entire farm - two and one-half miles.

"Speaking of roads reminds me that when we first settled here, 55 years ago, we cut a road 80 rods long through the heavy timber and brush to where we are now sitting. We were not sure where the corners of the 160 acres my stepfather homesteaded were, so we wanted to be sure to get somewhere on the right trail."

"Then came the log house and the clearing of land. The timber was dense and trees large, but soon a spot was ready to sow to wheat. The crop was grown and taken to the old Marble mill on Salmon Creek. We came home with our season's flour.

"We always laid in our sugar, coffee and other necessities in the fall when the roads were good. In

the winter we cleared land, occasionally saddling a horse and going to Vancouver after the mail.

"I forgot to tell you - my brother, William, and I have been together on the old farm all these years. Hay, potatoes and stock were what we specialized in. We stayed by this. One year we cleaned up \$3500 on spuds. We used to sell hay and potatoes to the government. Likewise, we furnished hay for the livery barns and city barns.

"It was in 1876 that we came west - lived in Portland for two years, moved up to The Dalles. I worked for a blacksmith there - wages, \$5 a week. Then we came here. For about 20 years I was school director here.

"Why the name Burton? We bought an acre of land where our school house is, from George Burton, a government clerk, and named the district for him. Lewis Conant and Monroe Woods, brother of the late Scott Woods, were two of our old time teachers.

"You know I got a bit lonely for the old pioneers who have passed on and as I scan the pages of the *Columbian* that we have taken for years, I see now and then the name of some one I knew a half century ago that has crossed the great divide. You see that bunch of timber over there? Six and one-half acres of trees that were here when we came. Well, a lot of people have wanted to buy those trees but we say no, they have grown to be our companions. Just something in that little forest in the fall and in the summer where all is shade that takes us back to the time when we loaded wheat to be taken to the old mill.

"Those days never will return. Horse and buggy days, one may call them, but we still cling to some of the old time customs. We never had a tractor, and a good team of horses still does our work. And there's

feed in the barn and plenty to eat in the house and ready cash, so I guess we have no cause for complaint."

Wes Livingston lives on the adjoining farm. "I was born in Clark county," he said. "My grandfather and father came here in the early days, I think in 1855, and settled on a high hill that still bears the name of Livingston mountain. That was where I

was born. I came on the old farm of 160 acres here 30 years ago, but have sold 80. It is all I can handle. I keep a number of cows, sell cream to a Vancouver concern, always have a number of hogs and we also have a good sized flock of hens. So we have a number of things to depend on for our income. This section has made a lot of improvements in 30 years, and is still on the upgrade."

**CLARK BROWN VISITS**

**The Nilsen Home at Pioneer to Hear  
Tales of Missionary Work on Island  
Of Madagascar More than 50 Years Ago**

It was in November, 1886, that the Paulus, a three-mast missionary sailing ship, was tossing in the waters of a port in Madagascar, ready for a long voyage. A large crowd of natives had gathered to bid farewell to a missionary and his family who were leaving, never to return. For 21 years he had been with them, had translated to their language the Bible and songs they sang at the little mission on the island. His daughter had nursed them in the hospitals and his son had been their teacher. The Paulus glided out to sea and they were bound for their old home in Norway.

A few days ago the writer visited the home of O. Nilsen of Pioneer. His brother, Herman, who lived nearby, was present. Together they told the story of their lives at Madagascar and their long journey to Clark county.

"Our family was all born in Madagascar," they said. "Father was a missionary there for 21 years. We boarded the Paulus in November, 1886, and arrived in Liverpool in April, 1887. One of our brothers died on board and was buried at sea.

"At Liverpool we took a steamship and at last reached Stavenger, our old home town of Norway. Our father read a pamphlet there, telling of the wonders of the Pacific Northwest. It appealed to him, so he and I left for America, leaving our family to come later if we decided to stay.

"August 5, 1888, we landed in Boston and started for Portland. The west had its charms. Father saw this land where we are now, a 120-acre farm, and bought it for \$3500, stock and all. And today four of us are living on the same old farm.

"It's almost half a century since we came here and great changes have taken place. The old military road which we called the Lonesome road, is now the Pacific Highway.

"Let's talk of Madagascar. It's the third largest island on the globe, 980 miles long, 280 miles wide. Here is a picture of some of the natives standing in front of one of our little missions of adobe with a grass roof. That tree is an eucalyptus, the first one ever grown on the island. Our father planted the seed. Where we lived was a delightful climate. The only poisonous thing was the scorpion. Lemons and pineapples grew wild in the woods. The cattle were humped shouldered and excellent beef. Sheep without wool were other freaks.

"I can remember some of the prices. Rice 25 cents a bushel, coffee \$1 a bushel, cigars \$1 a thousand.

"Just two things were to be feared in the woods. The wild boar and the crocodile. Yes, we can speak the Malay language. Here is a hymn book printed in their language. I will read a hymn for you."

## CLARK BROWN VISITS

### La Center to Find Origin of Name Ascribed to Geographic Location Of City During Pioneer Days

It was a 19 mile drive to Podunk, and that was the name for a short time before it was changed to La Center. Captain William Wier gave it the first name in 1872, and it was he who built the first house, ran the first store and was the first postmaster.

A crowd had assembled at the store of the Rhodes brothers, the older and the younger generation. The topic of conversation was who was the first mayor, who the first justice of the peace, where the first schoolhouse stood and why the name La Center.

At least two of these questions could be settled. Ralph Rhodes, city clerk, said The *Columbian* man and I will go to the city hall and search the records. And it was there we found that on September 2, 1909, the first council meeting was held and ordinances numbers 1, 2 and 3 were passed. Pat Kane was sworn in as city treasurer and N.R. Rashford, mayor, performed the ceremony.

June 8, 1895, the justice of peace docket tells of the first case tried in the justice court. It was a grand larceny case and the verdict guilty. His Honor Thomas M. White presided as La Center's first justice of peace.

As to why La Center was so named, none was quite sure. It was the opinion of one that the first store started here that established the trading point was midway between a store at Stroughton, a few miles away, and another at Kinder Rock.

But to be sure, all agreed it was best to see one who was a native son of La Center, Pat Kane of Vancouver, who said when we paid him a visit. "My understanding of the name is - the La of the name means "the" or "The Center."

And that's what it was - the center of trading for those who came from far around. Yacolt, Battle Ground, Chelatchie Prairie, Lewisville and from every direction the old settlers came to trade.

The old log school house, the first one built, stood about 100 yards north of the Stowbridge residence on the Pacific highway. The old school that I attended was built about one-half mile from town. It was a frame building and is now used as a dwelling house.

My parents came to La Center in 1858 and homesteaded 160 acres. Stock raising, growing hay and potatoes were the principal occupations. People prospered, it cost but little to raise stock and always a ready market could be found.

Logging companies came to buy oxen, and their wants were supplied as good stock was always raised.

A change now came. A party came and started a small saw mill, he made ties and then more came until I think there were 12, and they employed from 40 to 80 men, a big payroll. My brother and I were in the mercantile business. It was then that I was appointed postmaster in 1914 and served for eight and one-half years.

At last the timber was cut, the sawmills folded up and then back to the soil, which is rich in this section. And La Center has ever been a community of prosperous people. Of course, there has been a setback in the last few years.

A little more ancient history of La Center. The town site was laid out on December 6, 1875, by John H. Timmen. Frank B. Hobert came to La Center in 1872 and ran a store for more than 40 years. The only road to Vancouver in the early days was an Indian rail. The first boat to come up the east fork of the Lewis river was the Little Eagle of ten tons burden.

La Center of today finds smiling George Haskins, pioneer garageman and service station man, at the old stand where he has served the public for over 20 years. Mat Woodard, the next door hotel proprietor, a pioneer also for 39 years, is still a booster for La Center. Rhodes Brothers, general merchandise has been operated since January, 1924, as an up to date store. M.L. Bradway, who has just completed a new concrete building, has been in business 19 years.

The thriving real estate dealers, Johnson and Hiim, are also doing a lot of improving on their buildings. Mrs. Mary Hiim said, "We shall expect a story to follow this of our surrounding country where settlers are coming, attracted by the many advantages we have to offer."

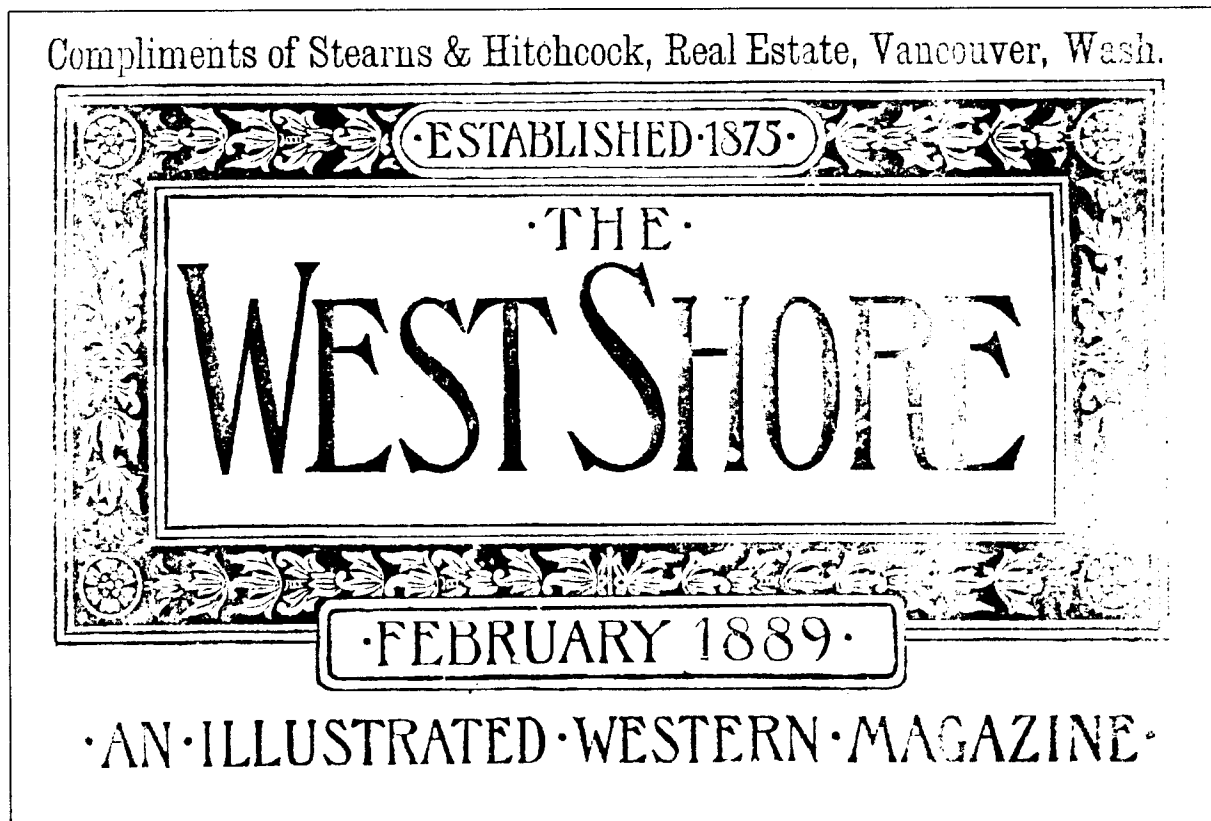

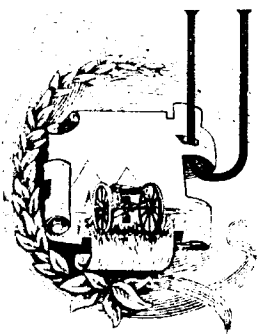

Samuel Publisher, Portland, Oregon. Although there are few names, you may enjoy seeing what life what like in the neighborhood over 115 years ago.

## VANCOUVER ON THE COLUMBIA



U PON the north bank of the great Columbia, and but a short distance above the mouth of the Willamette, lies the city of Vancouver, occupying the most beautiful and eligible site of any city in the entire northwest. Rising in a gentle slope from the river's brink, it commands a view of great extent and wonderful beauty.

To the south lies the great Willamette valley, between two parallel ranges of mountains; to the west the river soon loses its identity among the wooded hills; to the north stretches a region of timbered upland and forest-clothed hills and mountains, dominated by the great white mass of Mount St. Helens; but it is to the east the eye turns with the greatest sense of pleasure, for there, with the sparkling waters of the broad Columbia in the foreground, and framed in a massive setting of verdant mountains, the kingly Hood rears his snowy crown far into the heavens, a sight to fill with admiration every soul possessing a spark of love for the beauties of nature. On a clear day, when the sun has passed well to the south, so that the shadows cast by the huge, projecting ridges mark distinctly the deep canyons and glaciers that scar the mountain's sides, the view of Hood obtained by looking up the broad channel of the Columbia from Vancouver, is the most striking and enchanting the peak can offer. At no other point can all the elements of this great picture be had, and it is worth all the time and trouble necessary to obtain this view of Oregon's famous mountain. Sitting on the dock, waiting for the steamer, or promenading on the beautiful parade ground at the barracks, with its soft, green carpet, the eyes involuntarily turn toward the great

gorge of the Columbia, from which the great river issues in a mighty flood, and fasten themselves upon the commanding form of that majestic mountain with sensations of pleasure that seem never to lose their potency. It is a scene of which the eyes never weary, and one which can never be effaced from the mental canvas of one who has beheld it.

Vancouver dates its birth from the first quarter of the century, and was for years the commercial center of the entire region from California to Alaska and from the Pacific ocean to the summit ridges of the Rocky mountains. In 1823 the headquarters of the great Hudson's Bay Company, which had formerly been at Astoria—called Fort George by the company and other British subjects—were established at this point, and were given the name of that celebrated English explorer, Captain George Vancouver, one of whose lieutenants had ascended the river in a boat as far as this place soon after the discovery of the river by Captain Gray, in 1792. There were important reasons for this change of headquarters by the great fur company. All the routes of the company's employees from the various trapping grounds to the north, south and east, converged at the mouth of the Willamette, near which, of course, should be the great central station and supply point. An extra day's travel was necessary to reach the mouth of the river, and the vessel which came annually with supplies and to carry away a cargo of the accumulated furs, could ascend the stream and lie in safety along the bank of the river in front of the fort. Besides this, hay, grain and vegetables could be produced to better advantage. For years Vancouver was the hub of Oregon, a name far more comprehensive in those days than now, and so remained until the settlement of the Willamette valley by Americans raised up successful rivals. With interests antagonistic to the great fur company, the settlers

founded commercial centers of their own on the Oregon side of the Columbia river, both below the mouth of the Willamette and a few miles up that stream, from which has grown the great city of Portland. Until the complete withdrawal of the great fur company from this region, the same causes which had operated to make its headquarters the great center of this section retarded its growth as a general commercial point, and this condition of affairs was maintained so long that Portland, occupying a far inferior position in every respect, attained such a growth and such a hold upon the business of the country that all hope of supplanting it was vain. To this fact, and the further one that the conflicting claims of the fur company, the Catholic missionaries and the military authorities clouded the title of the best portion of the town site for many years, is due to the fact that the metropolis of this region is located on the Willamette instead of the Columbia. Happily, now, the question of title is set at rest, and nothing remains to interfere with the growth of the town, which still possesses

made that will permit an unobstructed passage of the deepest draft vessels that enter the Columbia. This channel will be made as soon as developments now in progress have reached such a stage as to render it desirable. The business men are taking steps to make this a port for general commerce, and as soon as these plans have matured, the channel will be opened and kept free for the passage of vessels. The cost will be nothing when compared with the benefits to be derived, and if the government appropriations can not be utilized for the purpose, then it will be accomplished by private enterprise. Many an ocean craft has rested at the docks of Vancouver in the past, and it will not be long before others will follow. In fact, the lighter draft vessels used in the lumber trade will soon be a common sight, as the extensive lumber enterprises now being founded there will engage largely in supplying lumber for foreign markets.

The most important enterprise now on foot in preparation for the new era spoken of is that of the Vancouver, Klickitat & Yakima railroad. More than a year

advantages to make it a commercial point second only to Portland, in the lower valley of the Columbia and Willamette. Brief attention is called to these advantages and to the means being employed to utilize them.

Sea going vessels of deep draught can reach this point cheaper and quicker than they can ascend the Willamette to Portland. Between the mouth of the latter stream and the docks at Vancouver there is but one bar, through which a channel can be maintained at greatly less expense than it now costs to keep one open to Portland from the same point. The opening of this channel, now closed for lack of use, could be made for less money than is annually expended to maintain the other in navigable condition. During seven months of the year there is now a channel from sixteen to twenty feet deep, and at an expense of \$4,000.00 one can be

ago this project received its inception, but the usual delays encountered by such enterprises held it back, so that until last fall no progress beyond a general reconnaissance of the route had been made. At that time the citizens decided upon an aggressive policy, and subscribed \$60,000.00 for the construction of ten miles of track leading into the timber and agricultural lands lying to the northeast of the city. Work was at once begun, and five miles are now completed and in operation, while the second five miles have so far progressed that they will be finished within a few weeks. The company has now on the road one engine and sixteen cars, and more rolling stock has been ordered. Using the first section as a basis of credit, money will be raised for the immediate extension of the line to Lewis river, and render that rich agricultural region tributary to Vancouver. This



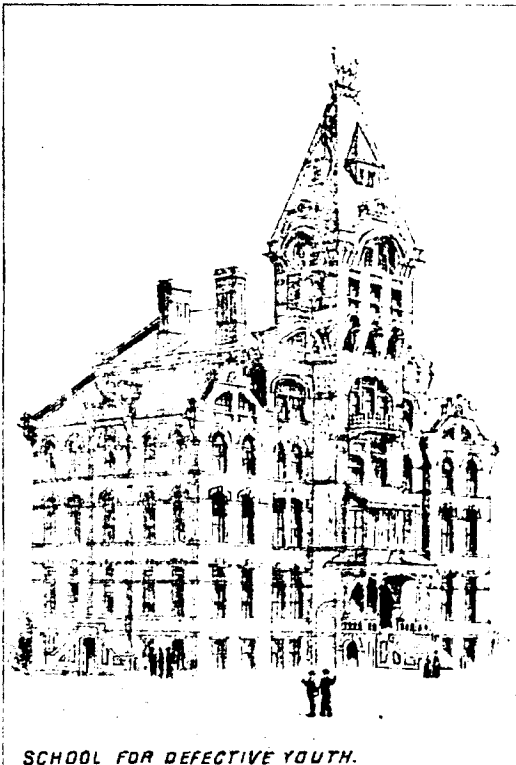

will be accomplished by the end of the current year. The next objective point is the extensive deposits of excellent coal lying on the proposed line of the road sixty miles from

the city, the nearest accessible coal to the Portland market.

This will be reached in another year, and will of itself



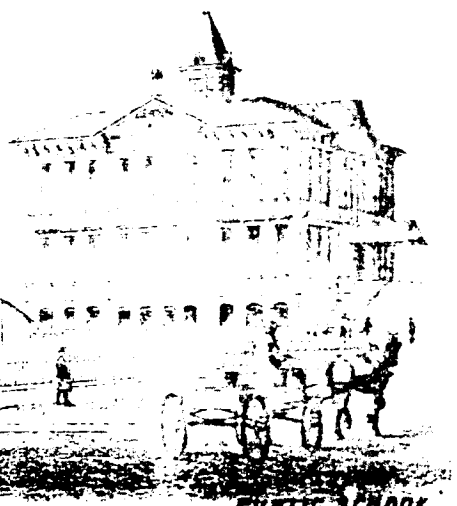

supply business enough to support the road. The ultimate object is to cross the mountains through the Klickitat pass and traverse the extensive stock and agricultural region lying east of the Cascades, making connection with the Northern Pacific, or some other transcontinental route, in the vicinity of the Columbia or Yakima rivers. By this line Vancouver would not only become a shipping point for a large area of country, but it would be a terminal point of a through route on a par with Portland, Tacoma, Seattle and other northwestern ports. It can not be doubted that the projects of this company will be fully realized within a very few years, by which time Vancouver will have increased largely in size and business importance under the influence of the causes already at work.

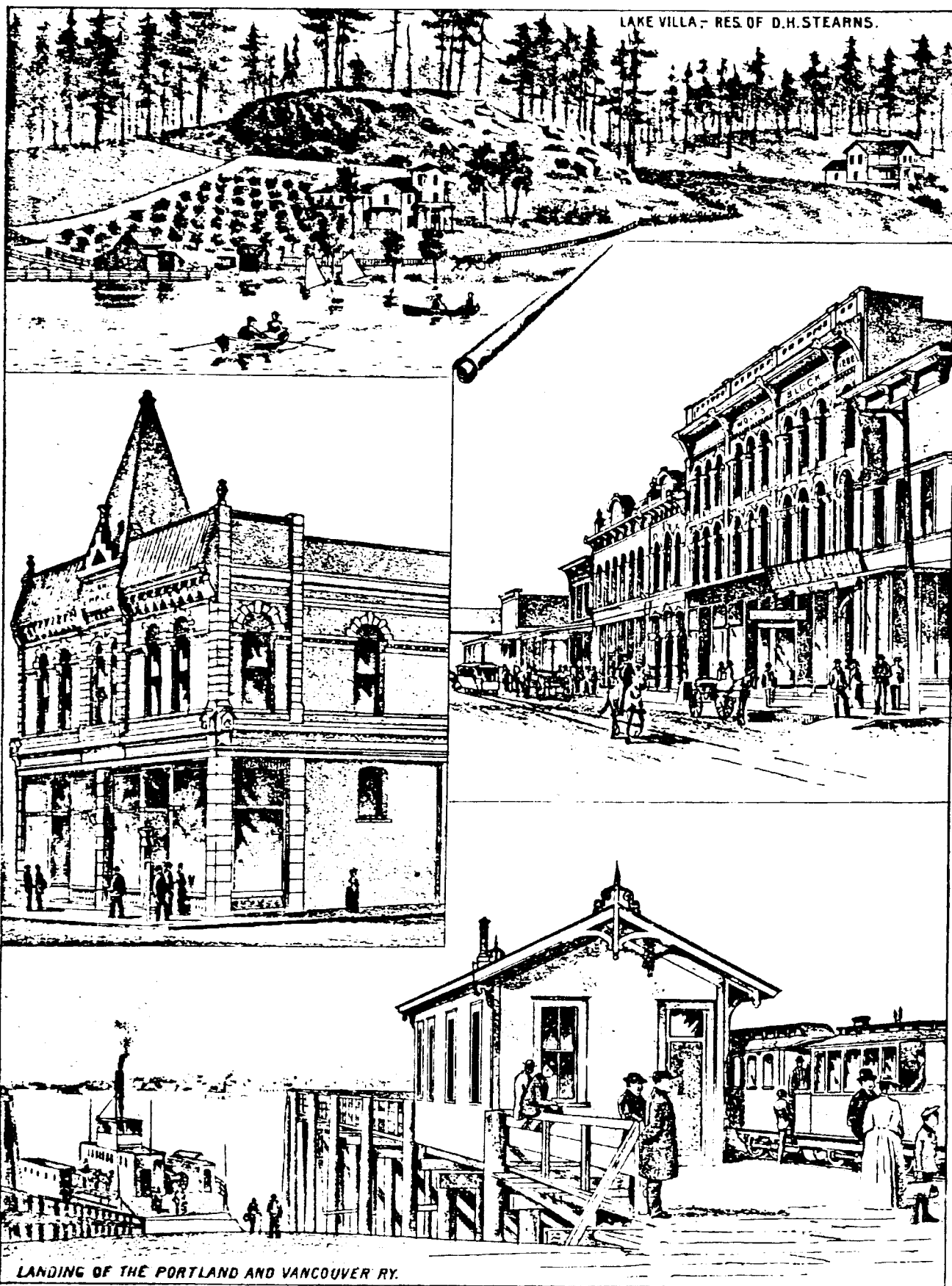
For a time the chief business of the road will be the transportation of logs from the magnificent timber district through which it runs, to the mills at Vancouver. Two hundred thousand feet of logs will be brought in daily, which will be used by four saw mills, three of which are now in operation, and the fourth, and largest, will soon be ready for business. The capacity of the road for the delivery of logs is practically unlimited, and as it will take years of the most extensive operations to exhaust the accessible forests, it needs no prophet to predict that lumbering operations at this point will increase greatly in magnitude in the next few years. A huge floating dock will be one of the conveniences for handling the product of the saw mills. This will contain six tracks, each accommodating two cars. Barges will be used for conveying the cars to the various lines of railroad centering in Portland, or for ferrying them across the river to the terminus of the Portland and Vancouver road. By this means the mills will be prepared to ship lumber by the car load to any point reached from Portland direct. When the V. K. & V. road is completed across the mountains they will also have a railroad outlet to the markets in that direction. Lumber will also be loaded here for San Francisco and other coast markets, as well as for foreign ports, and there is no reason why those points can not be supplied from this place as well as from any mill site on the Columbia river.

Manufacturing forms a considerable portion of the business of the city. Four saw mills are a good foundation to build upon, though other enterprises are already established, consisting of a sash and door factory, a flouring mill, an artificial stone factory, two brick yards, a brewery, an ice factory, machine shop, cabinet shop, and various smaller industries. A large furniture and box factory is under discussion and is one of the probabilities of the near future. Other industries would thrive at this point, especially canning and fruit drying, a barrel, tub and pail factory, a tannery and a woolen mill, the last two more especially when the road is completed across the mountains to the bunch grass country.

Mention of fruit preserving industries is not lightly made, for Clarke county is rapidly taking a commanding position in both the quantity and quality of the fruit it

produces. Apples of all varieties, pears from the earliest to the latest, cherries, plums and prunes are the kinds of fruit the soil and climate are best adapted to, and in size, flavor and general quality are second to none produced anywhere in the world. Grapes, peaches, apricots, etc., also do well, but are not of the superior excellence of the other fruits named. The celebrated Bartlett pear, known in the east as the "California's pear, reaches here a flavor and perfection superior to the best product of California. As the new orchards come into better bearing condition, Bartlett pears will be shipped from Vancouver by the car load. Plums, especially the Peach and Yellow Egg varieties, reach great size and perfection, and will form no small portion of fruit shipments. The same may be said of the Royal Ann and Black Republican cherries, whose large size and firmness render them especially valuable for shipment to distant markets. It is, however, in the prune that the fruit raiser finds his most profitable business. Experience has demonstrated that in Oregon and Washington, west of the Cascade mountains, the prune reaches a perfection in size, flavor and firmness that is unequaled anywhere else in the world. Even in the section named, some portions produce fruit superior to that of others, and in this respect Clarke county stands in the front rank. Only twelve years have passed since the first experimental trees were set out, and less than half that period since the result of the experiment became known, or the building of railroad lines made the industry a practicable one. Since that time many orchards have been set out, containing from one hundred to five hundred prune trees, which are now just coming into good bearing condition, several orchardists last year having harvested three tons of fruit per acre. The prune acreage is now being largely increased and in a few years, when the trees now being planted shall have arrived at good bearing condition, the fruit crop in the vicinity of Vancouver will be a very large and valuable one. Last year eight fruit dryers prepared one hundred tons of dried prunes for market, a quantity which will be exceeded the present season. Shipments of fruit in car load lots will also be a feature of the business. Pears, plums and cherries will be supplied in great quantities for this purpose, as the number of trees is being largely increased by all growers. Cars can be loaded at Vancouver and ferried to Portland the same as the lumber cars, and when the railroad across the mountains is completed a direct eastern route will be open. Fruit drying on a large scale, as well as canning of both vegetables and fruit, will necessarily become an adjunct of the industry at this point.

Not only fruit, but agricultural products of all kinds find special advantages in Clarke county. Near Vancouver, and in the Lewis river region, soon to be penetrated by the railroad, are to be found some of the best farms in the northwest. The country as a whole is densely covered with fine timber, and the process of bringing it into a cultivable condition is necessarily a slow one. In one respect this has

been advantageous, in that it has operated to prevent "bonanza farming" and the acquisition of large tracts. On the contrary, farms are from eighty to one hundred and sixty acres in extent, thus supporting a larger population in proportion to the area cultivated than is the case in the prairie districts, where large tracts are owned by individuals or companies. The building of the V. K. & V. road will aid in the work of bringing the land under cultivation, and it will enable settlers to do clearing to a better advantage and at less expense, as well as supply a means for them to reach market with the products of their land. Every acre of land denuded of its limber for lumber is also an acre rendered valuable for agriculture. This fact renders the more speedy development of the county's resources certain. Settlers who are looking for timbered agricultural lands will do well to examine the government and railroad lands of Clarke county, as well as private holdings offered for sale. The government land is in the foothills and mountains, where the ground is rough and heavily timbered. The most desirable unimproved lands, lying within from five to twenty miles of Vancouver, can be purchased at from \$5.00 to \$10.00 per acre, while partly improved farms can be bought at from \$15.00 to \$30.00 per acre. Good dairy ranches are worth from 830.00 to \$50.00 per acre. Land specially desirable for fruit, being high, dry and covered with valuable timber, and lying within five miles of the city, are held at from \$25.00 to 250 00 per acre in the wild state. Orchards with five-year trees are valued at from \$1,000 to \$1,500 per acre, but none are for sale, and the person who intends to embark in the fruit business must reckon upon planting his own orchard. The highest figure quoted has been refused for an orchard now in bearing. The cost of clearing land within a reasonable distance of the city is about \$40.00 per acre. It is figured that ten acres of prunes can be put in at a total cost of \$1,000.00, and that the use of the land between the trees for the four or five years during which they are maturing will pay for their cultivation. It is, of course, better not to raise any crop on the land while the trees are growing, but not to do so increases the expense of maintaining the orchard.

Dairying and stock raising are extremely profitable in this region. The foothills and mountains furnish a splendid range for cattle and sheep, which graze the entire year on the rich grasses and wild pea-vines that grow in luxuriance in the forests. Every settler finds that a small band of stock is a paying adjunct to his farm. The winters are so mild, and so little snow falls, that the perpetually green forage keeps the cattle in excellent condition at all seasons. A number of dairies are doing a good business, being located generally along the bottom lands of the various streams, where good meadows and excellent water exist in conjunction with the forest ranges. No regular creameries have yet been established, but there is an excellent opening for them. Millions of pounds of butter are imported into this region annually, and good dairy butter sells at from thirty to fifty cents per pound. Instead of importing butter, great quantities

of it should be shipped to less favored localities, and there scarcely seems a possibility that the dairy business can be overdone here for many years to come.

The city of Vancouver has a population of four thousand and possesses a full city government and many metropolitan features, including forty-five arc electric lights of twelve hundred candle power, put in by the city at a cost of \$11,000.00. There are an excellent water supply and a volunteer fire department, equipped with one steam engine, one hand engine and a hook and ladder truck. Besides the manufacturing industries previously alluded to, there are two banks, a building and loan association, a large number of stores, shops, etc., three churches, a cathedral, convent, hospital, court house, school house, and many neat and tasteful residences. The court house of Clarke county is a large brick structure, erected in 1883 at a cost of \$60,000.00. A large two story and basement school house, built about the same time, stands near the court house, and is one of the best school buildings in the territory. A large three story brick convent and orphanage, a hospital, a school for girls and a college for boys are maintained by the Catholics. Here, also, is the United States land office for the district. A handsome brick structure on the river bank just east of the reserve is occupied by the school for defective youth.

With the exception of a short period, Vancouver has been the military headquarters of this region, and is now the headquarters of the department of the Columbia, under command of General Gibbon. At this post are generally stationed six companies of infantry and one of artillery. The buildings embrace houses for the officers, barracks for the men, library, gymnasium, etc., and necessary magazines and ordnance storehouses, commissary warehouses, etc. The military reserve is one of the most beautiful in the United States, and the parade ground is an almost level tract of large extent overlooking the river and offering a splendid view of the distant mountains.

Under the impulse of the new enterprises now being undertaken, the value of desirable residence and business property will steadily increase. The Vancouver Land Company was organized in January, to supply cheap and desirable property for this purpose. The company has five hundred acres adjoining the city on the northeast, of which one hundred and sixty acres have been platted into blocks two hundred feet square, with north and south avenues eighty feet wide, and east and west streets sixty feet wide lots fifty by one hundred feet sell at from \$100 to \$150, according to location. The company has procured a franchise for a street railway, which will be built through the main business streets of the city to this desirable residence district. Vancouver Heights, as it is called, has a most commanding site, and is one of the most beautiful places of residence in the northwest.

Portland addition, consisting of twenty blocks, adjoining the city on the northwest, is another desirable place of residence. It is but three blocks from the school house, and about ten minutes' walk from the ferry landing. The line of

the Vancouver, Klickitat & Yakima railroad runs along its western edge. Blocks are two hundred feet square, lots fifty by one hundred feet, avenues eighty feet wide and cross streets fifty feet. Lots sell on easy terms at from \$150.00 to \$250.00. The location is high and healthful and affords a most commanding prospect of river, valley and mountain. Railroad addition, containing seven blocks, lies near the Portland addition, and is very desirable property. As residence lots in the town proper are worth from \$400.00 to \$1,000.00, and as these additions lie so near and are so much preferable for residence purposes, the prices now quoted for them are extremely low, and will not be maintained very long.

Vancouver is but seven miles distant from Portland by the line of the Portland & Vancouver railway and the Columbia river ferry. Trains run every hour, passengers making the entire trip for twenty-five cents, including the two ferries. This road is one of the improvements of the past year, and is owned by Portland business men. It will be one of the chief factors in the growth of Vancouver. By water the distance is about eighteen miles, three lines of steamers running regularly between the two points, one twice daily, one three times a week and one twice a week. Possessing all the advantages of a beautiful and healthful site, a tributary country of rich and rapidly developing resources, good and increasing facilities for reaching market, and an enterprising people determined to improve these advantages to the utmost, the future of the city is bright with promise.

### THE TOWN OF LaCAMAS.

**F**OURTEEN miles east of Vancouver, on the north bank of the Columbia river, lies the town of La Camas, second only to Vancouver in size in Clarke county. It has a population of one thousand, though but five years of age, the result of the manufacturing industries located there. LaCamas is one of those enterprising western towns that owe their existence to the fact that nature has provided at that point the elements which are requisite to their growth. Water power, shipping facilities and a country rich in agricultural and timber resources combine to give it a good reason for existence and a certain promise of future prosperity.

At this point are located two large manufacturing industries, the selection of this site by them being the foundation of the town. The Columbia River Paper Company, of Portland, maintains here a large paper mill, the only one in the Columbia river region. It is supplied with the best of machinery for the manufacture of news, print, manila and straw papers, including wood pulping machinery, and turns out a product of ten tons daily. There is, also, a flouring mill, as well as several smaller industries.

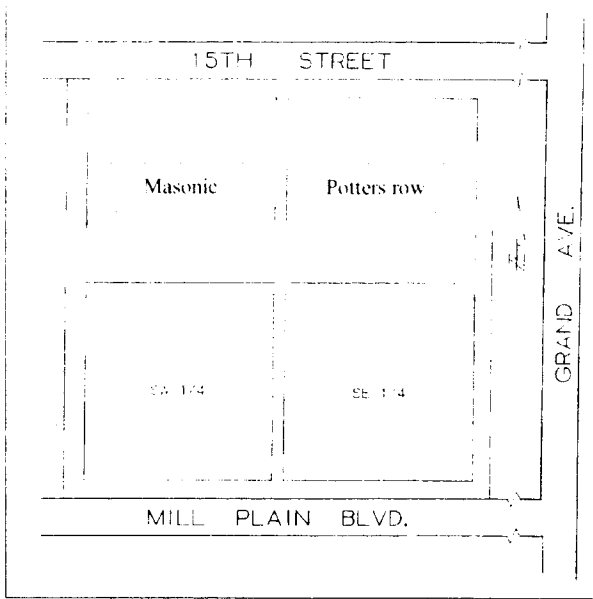
The most extensive enterprise is that of the La Camas Lumber Company, which gives employment in woods and mill to fully two hundred men. This mill is splendidly

equipped and is turning out seventy thousand feet of the finest quality of fir lumber daily. The water power used by the mills is never failing and is amply sufficient for other extensive industries. The water of LaCamas creek, flowing from LaCamas lake, is controlled and carried through an intervening mountain by means of a rock tunnel one-half mile in length, giving it a fall of one hundred and seventy-five feet, with an ample supply of water. Building sites for factories are plentiful and can be had at reasonable rates for that purpose. As a business point the town has special advantages. The mills supply a certain quantity of local trade, and a large section of tributary country adds much to its volume. Several large stores are doing a good business, and there are openings for others. Town property may be purchased at fair prices.

The surrounding country for a radius of ten miles is directly tributary to LaCamas, and is unsurpassed in fertility by any land in the world. The country is undulating until the mountains are reached, where it is more rugged. Although the body of standing timber is heavy, much land has been cleared and is under cultivation, and more is being added yearly. Dairying is carried on quite extensively by a number of farmers, and the conditions for success in that business are of the best. Clear water in abundance and fine ranges for stock in the forests, where natural grasses, the wild pea vine and other vines supply an abundance of food the year round, render the maintenance of cattle, both for stock and dairy purposes, both easy and profitable. The same conditions are favorable for hogs, and pork and bacon may be made to add largely to the farmer's income.

A special feature is being made of fruit, more particularly the prune, which reaches here great size and perfection and yields most prolific crops. Last year one man secured prunes to the value of \$600.00 from one acre of trees. Fruit trees are being set out extensively, and the industry promises to reach large proportions. At Lake Villa, the home of D. H. Stearns, on LaCamas lake, there is a young peach orchard which last year produced peaches of the finest quality. Other fruits, such as cherries, plums, pears, apples, etc., are also of especially fine quality. A cannery, where both fruit and vegetables will be preserved for market will be established in LaCamas and will be of great assistance in developing the fruit industry.

LaCamas lake is one of the most beautiful bodies of water in the west. It is three miles long and one-half mile wide, and is surrounded by beautiful, sloping banks, with gravel and sand beaches, the green of the forests making a charming frame for its mirroring surface. It is plentifully supplied with delicious lake trout, and three hundred thousand white fish were recently turned loose in its waters by the United States fish commission. As a pleasure resort it has no equal within the same easy communication with Portland. In the mountains, but a few hours' travel from the lake, are deer, bear, elk and other game, while the streams are teeming with the gamy and delicious mountain trout.



# Old City Cemetery Map

The Old City Cemetery Map shows four sections to the cemetery. The Masonic Cemetery is in the NW quarter and is again quartered with an ash graves in the center. The numbers begin with 1 at the upper NE corner of the quarter and go alternating west-east and east-west direction for the Eastern half. Then the numbers continue in the middle and alternate in the SW section of the Western half, finally continue at the top of the middle row of the NE section and alternating back to the middle where the ashes are located.

The NE quarter has a section know as the Potter's field at the far north of the section. The numbers begin at the SW corner of the section and alternate back and forth to the top where the potter field is located. Some graves have been added at the NE corner – or more likely, drawn there when the map was developed to keep the lines in order.

The SW section numbering is very straight forward, beginning in the SW corner, alternating to the NW corner, but because lot sizes differ, contains 208 lots (the SE section contains 144 lots).

The SE section, which concludes with this issue, begins in the SW corner and ends in the NE corner of this section with 144 lots.

#### **BRATTON, JOHN B.**

20 Apr 1846 Verona, Columbia County, Wisconsin, d. 27 Feb 1867, age 20y 1m 21d. Int. in SE 113-1 Line 1. Died in Vancouver, Clark County, Washington Territory. He was a member of the Masonic Order. **NOTE:** The Bratton Family came to the United States in 1847 with the two oldest children and settled in Verona Wisconsin. They arrived in Vancouver 4 Dec 1852 when John Bratton was 6 years old after much hardships crossing over the Oregon Trail with a covered wagon. Finally, after uncertainty they were granted a Donation Claim La Center in 1853. The mother, Mary Ann Bratton, died shortly after twin girls were born in 1854, she is probably buried on their claim. William Bratton Sr. was by trade a brick layer. In 1855/56, during the Indian uprising, he was Captain of the Lewis River Rangers 2nd Regiment Washington Volunteers. **Parents were Captain William Bratton Sr. (1816-after 1880) born in England and Mary Ann Garbelt (died about 1854) born in England.** Ref: #1, #3 #6 (1860 Census).

#### **GRIFFIN, JAMES**

b. 1855 Ohio, d. 22 Jul 1900 of dysentery, age 45y. Int. 16 Jan 1901 in SE 113 N/2 Line 1. He was a butcher; married to Clothida Amelia "Tillie" Heisen (1870-1946) on 1 Dec 1890 at Battle Ground, Clark County, Washington Territory. "Tillie" was a daughter of Alexander Rhinehardt Heisen and Mary Elizabeth Reylea. The James Griffin's had 4 children: (1) Mary Olive (1891- ), (2) Clara (1895 - ), (3) Harry (1897- ) and (4) Olive Griffin (ca 1901- ). "Tillie" married (2nd) 1 Jan 1903 James M. Sappington (1857-1924) and they are buried in Park Hill Cemetery. James Sappington was the son of John W. Sappington and Luncida Laughlin). **Parents were not listed.** Ref: #2, #3, #6 (1880 Census).

### SE 114

SE 114 All bought about 4/1888 by William Stevens.

**NOTE:** There is a conflict between Vancouver City Cemetery dates and the 1860 Clark County Census. The Census has William Steven's age 37y born in Ohio and as Mary Ann age 32 born in France: Children were: Charles W. age 11 and Theodore age 9 both born in Missouri, Edward age 7 born in Oregon, Adeline 5, and Francis age 2 both born in WT.

#### **STEVENS, WILLIAM G.**

b. 1817 St. Louis, Kentucky, d. Oct 1901, age 84y. Int. 22 Oct 1901 in SE 114-4 Line 2. He was married to Paula ( ) (1824-1904). He was a miller, owned his own home in 1900. **Parents were not listed but were born in the United States.** Ref: #3 & #6 (1880 & 1900 Census).

#### **STEVENS, PAULINE/PAULINA**

b. Jan 1821 France, d. 30 Oct 1904 of old age, age 83y 10m. Int. 31 Oct 1904 in SE 114 Line 2. (WILLIAM STEVENS). She was the widow of William Stevens (1817-1901), housewife, emigrated to the US in 1852. Children were born in Missouri and Washington: In the 1860 Census the children were: (1) William Charles (1849- ) -he was in the 1871 Census and not the rest of the children, (2) Theodore (1851-), (3) Edward (1854-1878 Missouri), (4) Adeline (1855- ), (5) Frank/Francis (1858-1921

Washington- was an engineer in a mill), (6) Sarah b. 1862 Washington Territory in 1870 Census -).  
**Parents were not listed but were born in France.** Ref: #3 & #6 (1880 & 1900 Census).

### STEVENS, THEODORE EDWARD

b. May 1854 Missouri, d. 1878 (?), age 24y, a miller. Int. 1878 in SE 114 Line 2. **NOTE:** he was listed in the 1880 Clark County Census as age 26y living with his parents house 44 61 District #3 in Vancouver, Washington. **Parents were William Stevens (1817-1901) born in Kentucky and Pauline ( ) Stevens (1824-1904) born in France.** Ref: #3 & #6 Clark County, Washington Territory (1880 Census ? he died in 1878).

### STEVENS, FRANK

b. 22 Feb 1858 Vancouver, Clark County Washington Territory, d. 2 Dec 1921 of a ruptured aorta, age 63y 9m 10d. Int. 6 Dec 1921 (1) in SE 114-1 Line 2 [KNAPP MORTUARY]. (The marker still in place) but he was reburied in St. James Acres Catholic Cemetery 27 May 1930 in family plot ? 240. He was married to Mary Emma Strong (1857-? 1930) daughter of Hiram H. Strong Sr. (1829-1904) and Rebecca Turner (1837-1913) both buried in the Washougal Cemetery). Frank Stevens was a marine captain, Episcopalian, lived at 508 East 14th St., Vancouver, died at the St. John's Ferry attended by Frank R. Menke for Coroner Smith of Portland. The funeral was 6 Dec 1921 at KNAPP CHAPEL 10 AM with Reverend Charles H. Powell. Charged to son Earl Stevens of Vancouver (1895-1969) in same plot. **Parents were William Stevens (1817-1901) born in Kentucky and Pauline ( ) Stevens (1824-1904) born in France.** Ref: #3, #4, & #6 (1880 Census).

### STEVENS, HENRIETTA

b. 1856 Washington Territory, d. 22 Sep 1897 of consumption, age 41y. Int. 25 Sep 1897 in SE 114 Line 2. She was married to Charles William Stevens Jr. (1849/1850- Missouri) Children were all born in Washington Territory: (1) Sarah (1874 -), (2) Charles (1875-1900), and (3) Stella M. (1879-1888). **Parents were not listed but her father was born Michigan and mother was born in Illinois.** Ref #3 & #6 (1880 Census).

### STEVENS, ALICE

1877 Washington, d. 19 Oct 1879 no cause of death was listed, age 2y. Int. Oct 1879 in SE 114-8 Line 2. **Parents were William G. Stevens Jr. (1850 - ?) and Haenrietta ( ) (1856-1897) born in Washington.** Ref: #3.

### STEVENS, STELLA M.

b. 1879 Clark County, Washington Territory, d. 15 Apr 1888, age 8y, died of a tumor. Int. in SE 114 N/2 Line 2. **Parents were William G. Stevens Jr. (1850- ?) and Henrietta ( ) (1856-1897).** Ref: #3.

### STEVENS, REBECCA

b. Feb 1885, d. 15 Dec 1888 of burns to the body, age 2y 10m, Int. 17 Dec 1888 in SE 114 Line 2. **Parents were William Stevens Jr. (1850- ?) and Henrietta ( ) (1856-1897).** Ref: #3.

### STEVENS, THOMAS CAFFERY

b. 1890, d. 3 May 1941 died of angina pectoris, age 51y. Int. 8 Jul 1941 in SE 114 Line 2. (WILLIAM STEVENS) [VANCOUVER FUNERAL CHAPEL]. **Parents were William G. Stevens Jr. (1850- ?0 and Henrietta (1856-1897)** Ref: #3 & #5.

### STEVENS, CHARLES W.

b. 1873 Clark County, Washington Territory, d. 1900 of consumption, age 27y. Int. in SE 114 line 2. (WILLIAM STEVENS). **Parents were William C. Stevens Jr. (1850-?) and Henrietta (1856-1897).** Ref: #3.

**BOWLES, MINERVA WILSON**

b. 30 Oct 1841 Missouri, d. 27 Sep 1926 senile, age 84y 9m 3d. Int. 30 Sep 1926 in SE 116-4. She was the widow of Jesse T. Bowles (1830-1906). **Parents were General Anthony Wilson (1819-1849) born Saline County, Missouri and Sarah Switzler (1817-1852) born in Virginia/Kentucky.** Ref: #1, #3 & #6 (1860 Census.)

**BOWLES, JOHN B.**

b. 5 Oct 1862 Clark County, Washington Territory, d. 14 Oct 1882 no cause of death was listed, age 20y 9d. Int. in SE 116-3 Line 4 (has marker "Departed this life Oct 14 1882 Aged 20y 9d's "Fessus Est Quietus") (JESSE T. BOWLES). **Parents were Jessie Bowles (1830-1906) and Minerva Catherine Wilson (1841-1926).** Ref: #1 & #3

**WILSON, SARAH (SWITZLER) LOGSDEN, WILSON, STODDARD**

b. 17 Jul 1818 (or 26 Dec 1817 on marker age 34y 3m 11d) Virginia or Kentucky, d. 6 Apr 1852 in Oregon, Int. Apr 1852 in SE 116-8 line 4 (has marker "Departed this life"). (JESSE T. BOWLES). Brown, (d) John Greenville Wilson married Maude ( ) and lived in San Fransico, California, and (e) James Hamilton Wilson married Mary Wells Sarah Switzler, Logsden, Wilson married (3) 10 Apr 1851 in Clackamas, Oregon Thomas H. Stoddard Note: Asa A. She and her brother, Charles Hague lived in the 1870, 1871 Census with their mother, Elizabeth, and her 2nd husband Lewis Meyers both born in Germany. Elizabeth and Louis Meyers had three children by 1870. **Parents were William G. Daniels (1817-1894) born in Ohio and Sarah Hall (1824-1907) born in New York.** William G. The funeral was 19 Nov 1935 1 PM at KNAPP CHAPEL with Reverend Martindale Woods of Vancouver. Also in the Hathaway plot is daughter Margaret Hathaway (1900-1915 has marker). Ordered by Mrs. Dolla Hathaway and sons: Charged to Mrs. Dolla Hathaway and Duck Shooting Credit of \$25 ? (1937). **Parents were Jeremiah Smith Hathaway (1824-1876 born in Herkimer County, New York (the son of Nadah Hathaway and Abigail Beebe) and Isabella Electa Bates (1827-1914) born in Niles or Berrien County Michigan** (daughter of Dennis Bates and Isabella Bronson). In 1852 they and Jeremiah's brother Marshall joined a Wagon Train led by John Johnson of Umpqua, Oregon. They expected to go to California via the Santa Fe Trail, but the Indians were on a rampage so they turned north for Oregon. They took in Jabez D. Knapp and his wife, Lucy, who was suffering from cholera and had been set adrift. The Hathaways's nursed them but the wife Lucy died and Isabella caught the cholera and nearly died. Their son Jeremiah died near the Dalles Oregon 23 Oct 1852 and is buried by the Cascades near the Bridge of The Gods. After living in Portland several years Jeremiah took out a Donation claim near Ridgefield, Washington and started a diary business, He was a Probate Judge of Clark County, Washington. ## **Researching by e-mail or snail mail at CCGS**

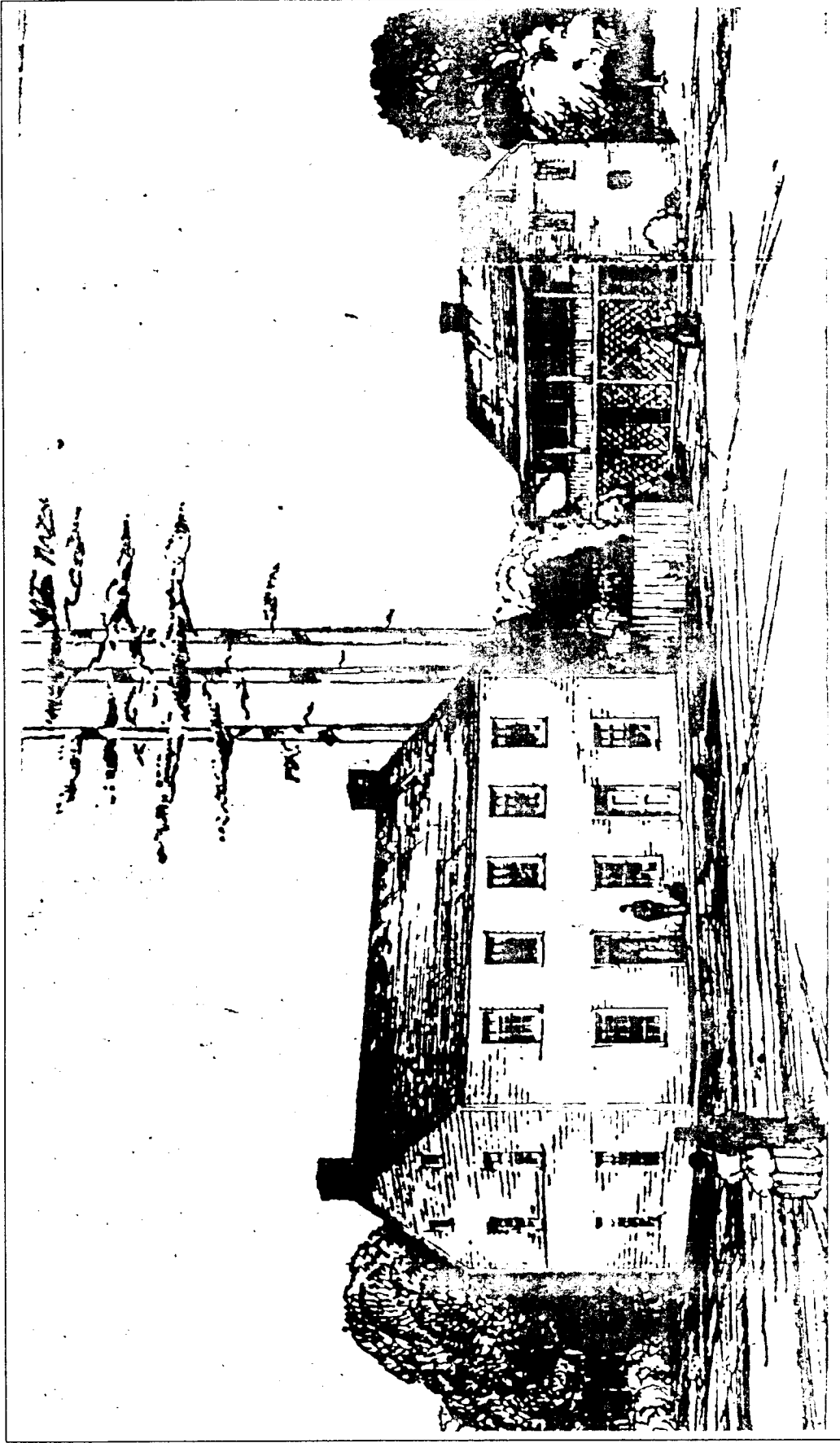

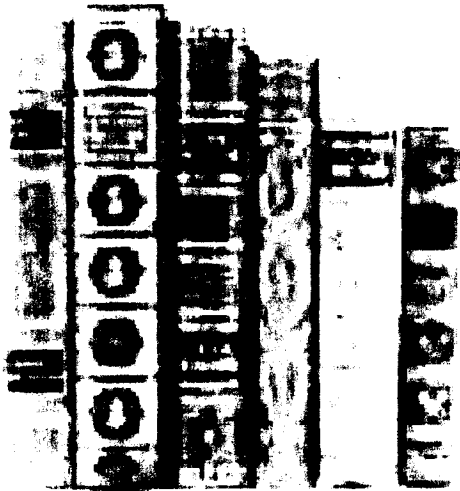

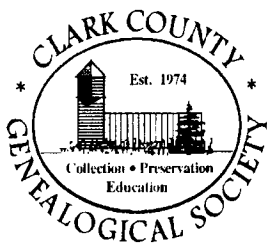
