

Danes Come to Cushing Area -- Russ Hanson

There were two settlements of Danish immigrants to the Cushing area. One group settled on the east side of what became Cushing; the other in North Valley. There are differing accounts of each.

In trying to reconcile the two accounts we need to know that Nels Gullickson, a Norwegian, was already living on what became the SW side of Cushing main street, and another Norwegian family, Ola Brune (he was also called Brown or Brunelund) about 2 miles south of Cushing.

In the River Road Ramblings Inter-County Leader article by Carol Brenholt Medchill a few weeks ago where the history of Cushing Danish settlement is told, the following statement is A group of Danes arrived in New York made: May 1, 1870. From there they traveled by train to Madison, Wisconsin. They went to a land office in Madison and bought land located near the present site of Cushing. After purchasing cows, horses, and oxen they started in immigrant wagons on the long hard trip to their new home. The roads from Madison to St Croix Falls were very poor. North of St Croix Falls there was nothing but a trail to follow and that ended within two miles of Cushing. Here the Danish settlers found a kind Norwegian family by the name of Brune who offered them shelter until the men should have made their way through the heavy timbers to their farms and built shacks for their families.

I found another account in the Standard Press written by Walter Dahl as part 2 of a history of Eureka Township in about 1970. Walter lived

near Wolf Creek and collected local history. His story goes:

In the spring of 1869, the Nels Gullickson family arrived in Eureka, settling on the farm now owned by LaVern Larson (this seems to be the wrong family, as Nels Gullickson settled on the west side of what became mainstreet in Cushing. I think it was the same Brune Family mentioned in the Brenholt story). Later in the early fall, three families, the Johannes Gudmunson's, Ole Larson's and Johnson's came in a group, fourteen of them. For the first few weeks they lived with the Gullickson's (probably the Brunes) until a cabin could be built for them on the place owned now by Joe Smith. Here they all lived the first winter until log homes were made for the Larson's and Johnson's in the land in Section 10 bought from the government for \$1.25 per acre. You may remember Gust Gudmunson who lived at the corner of County Trunk G and 87 where his son Clifford now lives. He was only 8 months when he came there with his parents. The Johnson's had four small boys, John, Gust, Anton, and Carl.

Walter collected stories from previously written articles or histories as well as interviewing people. It is likely that some settlers stayed with Gullickson and some with Brune.

The 1870 census shows some in Cushing, some in North Valley and the Frederickson family(who settled near Cushing) staying in the home of an A. Brown (Brune) in June of 1870.

The River Road Ran Start at St Croix Falls then loop north up the River Road on River Rd (4 miles beyond the top of this map to the Grettum flowage then east to highway 87 and south again down Hwy 87.
